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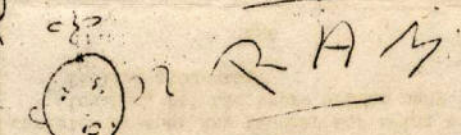

Something to think about. Do you itch your scratch or scratch your itch. Also will a square plug fit in a round hole or a round hole fit in a square plug.

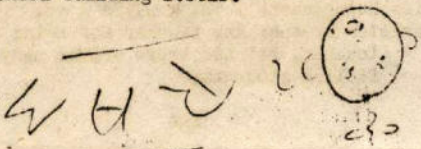


Hip! Hip! Hooray!!!!
