FROM THE GUIDANCE ROOM

The trend toward more than a high school education is rapidly growing. One of the factors contributing to this trend is certainly economic, that is, people simply have more money than they used to. In times of prosperity enrollment in higher institutions has always increased and even though the economy seems to be in somewhat of a recession (no one, particularly Republicans in an election year, likes to use the word "depression") the demand for education beyond high school continues. In more and more instances the junior colleges are going to be meeting this need and any high school student will do well to consider the junior colleges, their growth and purpose to see if the junior college might be the answer to the question... "After high school... what?"

Because of our nearness to Florida, the status of the junior college movement in that state is of particular interest. This fall, more than 15,000 students will be enrolled in 14 junior college areas in Florida. This represents a sharp increase over the 4,300 enrolled only two years ago and is a 50% increase in last year's junior college enrollment. By 1970 it is predicted that the public junior colleges of Florida will have an enrollment of 17,000...over 4 times as many as this year.

This trend toward local higher education for the first two years in liberal arts and pre-professional areas will enable the state universities to concentrate on advanced professional and graduate work. The junior colleges will also provide for the after-high school needs of young people and adults who are planning for careers below the professional level.

Four new public junior colleges will open this fall: BREVARD JUNIOR COLLEGE, Cocoa; DADE COUNTY JUNIOR COLLEGE, Miami; INDIAN RIVER JUNIOR COLLEGE, Fort Pierce and JUNIOR COLLEGE OF BROWARD COUNTY. Other public junior colleges include CENTRAL FLORIDA, CHIPOLA, DAYTONA BEACH, GULF COAST, MANATEE, NORTH FLORIDA, and ST. PETERSBURG. (Florida also has three privately supported junior colleges: FLORIDA CHRISTIAN, ORLANDO JUNIOR and ST. LEO.

Another interesting item is the news that a new four-year college has been announced for the area around St. Petersburg... the interesting part isn't that a new college is opening but that it is open to all races (the above named junior colleges opening this fall are specifically labeled for WHITE students only...PURE white, that is). It is an encouraging sign and a sign of the future. The school is FLORIDA PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE and it is admitting 300 freshmen this year. They will attend classes at St. Petersburg's maritime school on Tampa Bay. A new 260-acre waterfront campus is planned for the college and it will emphasize the humanities, social sciences and natural sciences.

Remember the advertising slogan, "Is there a Ford in your future?"...you might ask yourself, "Is there a junior college in my future?"

Come into the Guidance Room for detailed information...the junior college might fit very well into your future.

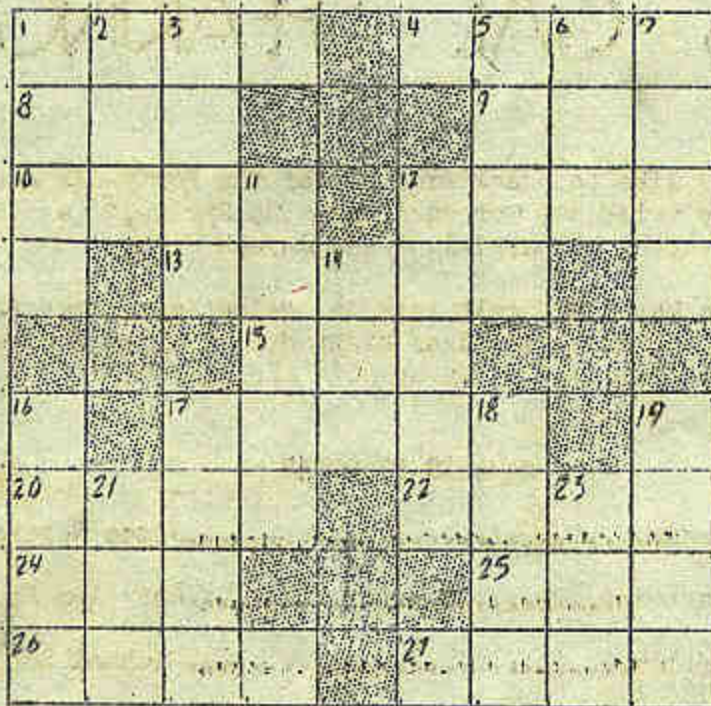
