


Things to see and things to do. Rent a car or take a guided tour and get to know the rest of our island.

### currency

The currency of the Netherlands Antilles is the NAf (guilder). The official rate at which the banks accept US dollar banknotes is NAf 1.77; checks at 1.79. Travellers checks accepted everywhere. The rate of exchange granted by the shops and hotels ranges from 1.75 to 1.80. Under present circumstances the above rates are subject to change.

The guilder is divided into 100 cents, and there are coins of 1 cent, 2 1/2 cents, 5 cents (square nickel), 10 cents, 25 cents, and the 1 and 2 1/2 guilder coins. Banknotes are issued in denominations of 1, 2 1/2, 5, 10, 25, 50, 100, 250 & 500 guilders.

# san nicolas

Sometime during your stay on Aruba you should pay a visit to San Nicolas. On the south eastern part of the island, San Nicolas offers a different view.

In the hey-day of the Exxon refinery, San Nicolas was a bustling company town. Today, with the departure of Exxon, San Nicolas has turned to tourism for its livelihood. The first section of Mainstreet has been converted to a lovely tiled Promenade where you can leisurely stroll while shopping in the attractive stores offering many items from around the world. Also, many Oranjestad shops have extensions in San Nicolas.

Every Saturday from 4-7pm there occurs the Flea Market Festival on the Promenade. The Festival features different social and cultural activities, including live entertainment. Shopkeepers participate by displaying selected merchandise outside their stores to give a country fair atmosphere. The prices are special as well.

San Nicolas is easy to find. If you're driving, just follow our island map. Bus service from your hotel is also available as is taxi service. While in San Nicolas, make sure you stop in at Charlie's Bar at Zeppenfeldstraat 56. Like San Nicolas, Charlie's too, is unique!

# of flora & fauna

Aruba is a unique vacation spot, not only because of its beautiful beaches, but also for the interesting wildlife which is found on land, in the air, and in the surrounding coral reefs. There are several snorkeling areas (see island map) where tropical fish are in abundance and where live coral portrays a beautiful underwater landscape for the snorkeler and diver. While driving through the countryside, you'll see a spectacular variety of cacti and lizards as well as many species of birds such as the pelican, the parakeet, the trupial and the cute little bannaquit. Aruba is also a stopover for many migrating flocks. Sunset at the bird sanctuary is an unforgettable experience.

Some of our timid animal residents include the large iguana, the rare rabbit, and the even rarer Aruban burrowing owl. Aruba has a local conservation group, Stinapa-Aruba, which has published a guide to our flora and fauna. "Discover Aruba's Wildlife" is available at most hotel gift shops and downtown bookstores.


Unfortunately, as the island's population grows and the number of visitors increases, there's a noticeable decrease in the amount and variety of species to be found. Local efforts are being made to halt this rapid decline in wildlife, since we too, as in many other parts of the world, are becoming aware of the desirability of preserving what we have so that others who come after us may see and enjoy it too. A large part of Stinapa's efforts are aimed at the creation of a national park near Yamanota, Aruba's highest peak.



# driving around aruba


The white powdery sand and the blue-green waters of the Caribbean Sea make it difficult for the average visitor to leave Aruba's magnificent beaches. But there's more to Aruba's beauty than the hotel lined beaches of the leeward coast. A whole other world awaits the adventuresome tourist striking out for a day of exploration. You'll be amazed by the island's diversity and unusual topography. Using the roadmap we've provided on preceding pages, orient yourself. For the most part the roads will be good, but be prepared for poorly marked signs and the occasional dirt road. This is all part of the experience. Remember, the island is only 19.6 miles long and 6 miles wide, so you can't stay lost for long. Don't hesitate to ask directions. The friendliness and warmth you've experienced at the hotels is true of the entire Aruban population.

Assuming that you've already taken in a little of Aruba's capital city, Oranjestad, our tour proceeds east along the coastal road (toward the airport) out of the city and into the "cunucu" or Antillean countryside.

Aruba was discovered by the Spaniards around 1500 A.D. At this time the island was inhabited by the Caiquetios, a tribe of the Arowak Indians. The Spaniards promoted cattle breeding on the island and later when the Dutch took possession in 1636 they began to breed horses on an even larger scale for eventual export to neighboring islands. The port at which all of this importing and exporting took place was dubbed 'Horses' Bay Harbor". Today it is known as Schooner Harbor (in the area of Paarden Baai). It is port for the hundreds of cruise and cargo ships that come to the island each year.

As you continue to drive east-ward past the airport, you'll notice Hooiberg, a cone-shaped mountain to your left. This mountain or "Haystack" as its name translates, although not the tallest peak on the island is perhaps the most noteworthy. Its elevation is 541 ft. and composed of a rock formation so unlike any other that it has been given its own geological designation as Hooibergite. This type of volcan-

ic origin is only to be found in Aruba and in Iceland. It's possible to climb the Hooiberg and in the summer the climb is enhanced by the brilliance of the yellow flowering Kibra Hacha (break axe) tree which covers the mountainside. At this juncture in the tour don't turn left, but stay on the boulevard. You'll meet Hooiberg from another angle later in the tour and can then make your pilgrimage up its slope.

To the right you'll notice the Industrial Harbor of Barcadera (Y). This is the home of one of the largest saltwater distillation plants in the world. It not only supplies the entire island and refinery with fresh water, but combines this process to generate electrical power for the island.

To the north of the highway, across from Barcadera Harbor, take a road parallel to Aruba's only drive-in theater, turning right at the first major intersection. This road will take you through Frenchman's Pass (Franse Pas), where sometime during the 17th century, French pirates are said to have attempted an invasion of the island. According to local legend a group of Indians waged battle with the Frenchmen in this narrow passage but were pushed back and in fact trapped in a cave which the French set fire to. The Indians died of suffocation. Today, this is one of the island's more scenic sights and popular home to the unusual green and yellow wild parakeets.

Ahead and to the right on this same road, you'll come to the ruins of a 19th century gold smelting works (K), Gold was discovered in Aruba in 1824 and was actively mined until 1916 when it ceased to be economic, During the 92 years of its discovery, nearly 3,000 lbs of gold was exported. Here at the Balashi smelting works one can see the remains of the kettles and the ovens used in the process. One will also find some fine examples of the windshaped Watapana (Divi-Divi) trees which have become Aruba's trademark. These trees point to the southwest, away from the ever-present tradewinds.

Another abundant specie of plant life found on the island is the Aloë. Ahead and to the left of this road as it winds back toward the southern coast, you'll notice large Aloë fields (Z) still being cultivated. Used in medicines and suntan lotions, Aruba once supplied 30% of the world's aloë need. Today production has dwindled and now the island's crops service a local factory which manufactures. Aloë cosmetics.

Crossing the highway, wind your way down to the shore to find another one of Aruba's favorite snorkeling areas... Spanish Lagoon (Spaans Lagoen). This is a very picturesque spot where it's also possible to picnic under the shore reinforcing mangrove trees. Legend has it that the lagoon was once a hideout for pirates looting wealthy cargo ships in the Caribbean. There's little evidence to substantiate this story, but nonetheless it adds to the mystique of this already interesting spot.

### driving tips

- 1. International road signs are used on Aruba's highways and streets.
- Foreign and international driver's licenses are valid if used by a country member of the Geneva Convention.
- 3. Car speedometers and road signs are in KILOMETERS.
- Speed limit in built-up areas is 40 kmph, out of town it's 60, unless a higher or lower speed is specifically indicated.
- 5. Much of Oranjestad's traffic is one-way.
- Where there are no road signs, traffic from your right has the right of way.
- Be extra careful on wet roads. Because rain is infrequent here, oil and dust build up on road surfaces and then when it does rain, cause very slippery conditions.

- Know your rented car before you drive off. Check position and operation of indicators, horn, handbrake, lights, wipers, etc.
- Before setting out (especially on unpaved roads) check the condition of the tires and spare, etc. Aruba's north coast plains are well worth seeing and accessible by road tracks one can easily follow.
- Arubans are very friendly drivers. At any time they may stop to greet, converse or give right of way to another driver. Be alert and drive defensively.
- If at any time you get lost, simply seek out high ground and sight either Lago's smoke stacks or the Concorde Hotel to reorient yourself.
- Although our goats are very "street-wise", excercise caution when large herds are on the roadside.
- At any time, at any place, should you be involved in an accident, do not move your car. Notify the police immediately by dialing 100.

Back on the highway, you'll resume your journey toward the eastern tip of the island. As you proceed, you'll pass an area known as Savaneta. Some of the oldest traces of human inhabitation have been excavated here. It was once the capital of the island. In the distance, you can see the beginning of the Lago Oil concession, which extends to the southern-most tip of the isand. As you follow this road, always keeping the oil tanks on your right, you'll drive through the city of San Nicolas, Aruba's second largest city. This city owes its existence to phosphate mining which began in 1879. It quickly became the most important industrial center and was also the center of commerce some years later for the near 9,000 emoloyees who worked for the oil refinery in the late 1940's.



DISTINCTIVE

The Lago Oil & Transport Company, Ltd., a wholly owned subsidiary of Exxon corporation, was established in 1929. This was the single most important happening in the island's modern nistory. Once one of the largest oil refineries in the world, it processed over 400,000 barrels of crude oil daily. In March of 1985, due to lowered world production, Lago officially closed this refinery, ending 60 years of continuous operation.

East of San Nicolas is an area called Seroe Colorado with two beaches of note: Baby Beach and Rodgers Beach, Colorado Point is another place of interest. From here it's possible to see the coastline of Venezuela and the pounding surf of the island's windward coast. If you're in a walking mood, climb down the cliffs and you'll find a natural bridge.

Before leaving Seroe Colorado, wildlife lovers will look carefully for the iguana, which is plentiful in this community due to laws which protect it here.

Just outside the Seroe Colorado gates, traveling on dirt roads, you begin your journey along the rugged northern coast at Boca Grandi, Find the signs directing you to the caves of Guadirikiri (H) (a haven for wild parrots) and Fontein. These are caves once used as dwellings by the Arowak indians. In both, you'll find excellent examples of ancient indian drawings. Although not fully decoded, it's assumed that these markings had a magical meaning and played a part in the custom of sacrificial offerings.

From Fontein you'll see the dunes of Boca Prins and Dos Playa, two northcoast beaches. Although not recommended for swimming, these are beautiful places for picnics and for absorbing the impact of the crushing sea.

Now work your way inland toward Yamanota, a hill easily recognized by the communication tower erected at its peak. This is Aruba's highest point. You can drive your car to the top and enjoy the panoramic view it offers of both coasts and the eastern and western tips.

Winding your way down and turning left toward the area of Masiduri, proceed to the government restored Masiduri cunucu house, the road to which is vaguely marked by a white sign. Turn left and proceed up and then down to the site. The gates to these grounds are frequently closed, so it might be wise to call the Tourist Bureau for the hours that it is open to the public.

Now go back to the paved road and find the road west to Santa Cruz, another one of Aruba's oldest inhabited areas. Although little is known about the coming of Christianity to the island, tradition has it that a Calquetio came with a small group of Spaniards from the mainland. Together they worked to convert some of the native population, raising Aruba's first cross in the area whose name now commemorates the event... Santa Cruz. A cross which is lighted at night, has been erected on the same site and is visible from the road. Here too you'll spot the aforementioned Hooiberg.

Turning right off the main Santa Cruz road, past the police

station, follow the signs to Ayo where great piles of huge diorite boulders stand in defiance of geological explanation. Possible remnants of ancient volcanic action, they may have once formed parts of ravines that came down from high mountains of South America. Follow the marked trails through the boulders and don't forget to take a look at the old "Dwelling", a cave where indian markings are still preserved.

Ahead on the same road treat yourself to the spectacular waters and pounding surf of Andicuri Beach. Privately owned, this coconut grove and sand beach can be enjoyed for a fee of just \$1.50

per car.

Back-tracking a bit to the paved road, turn right toward the gold mill ruins of Bushiribana(K). This old stone structure is further evidence of Aruba's gold heyday. In operation from 1825 to the First World War, this was the site of the island's surface mining. Although none of the gold mined on Aruba was left, they say flecks of gold can still be found on the ground and in the gullies around the mill.

Veering east along the coast you'll come to the Natural Bridge (P). The biggest and highest in the This place is called Casi Bari (D). A viewing platform has been constructed on top of a rock.

Now go north to the Church of Santa Ana in Noord (T). This church has a beautiful wood altar which is over 100 years old. In 1870 this work of art was awarded a prize at an exhibition in Rome. The altar was sent from Holland to the mission in the Netherlands Antilles in 1928.

Another historical spot on the windward coast is the Chapel Alto Vista (S). This picturesque chapel is built on the foundations of Aruba's first mission dating back to the first half of the 18th century. A small group of indians worshipped here and many artifacts can still be found. The original chapel deteriorated after some years and the present-day building was consecrated in 1952. There's a yearly pilgrimage to Alto Vista during october.

Heading inland once again toward Paradera, you might drive up to Crystal Mountain (L) (Kristalberg) where deposits of quartz and diorite are exposed and can be collected. The entrance to the mountain will be on your right and will resemble a long driveway. If you look up you'll see a shelter. This marks the site.

South and to the east is another cluster of giant diorite boulders.

From the chapel you can see California Point (F), a lighthouse marking the northern most tip of the island. Near the lighthouse to the south is a lovely beach called Arashi, This too, makes for excellent snorkeling.

Having successfully rounded the island, and rejoining the calm of the leeward coast, it would be worth your while to take one final moment at the Bubali bird pond (W). Just south of the old windmill opposite the Concorde Hotel, the pond is a bird lover's paradise and a fitting ending to an eventful day.





### golf

The Aruba Golf Club welcomes visitors. The 18-hole course (11 actual holes played a variety of ways) is located on 82 Golfweg near San Nicolas at the eastern end of the island (see island map). ### sail & ski

In comfortable, stable trimarans or catamarans, cruise along enjoying snacks, refreshments and a view of the bikini filled beaches. Day sails and sunset cocktail sails take place every day. Details at your hotel desk.

The gentle surf along the beaches allow for great water skiing and Sunfish sailing. Rentals and instructions available at all the hotels. Here's your chance to do all those exciting things you've read about in the sports and travel magazines. Don't wait till your last day, make a skiing and sailing appointment today! You'll be glad you did. Pedal hoats and sea jeeps can also be rented.

### bowling

The airconditioned Camacuri Bowling Center has four alleys, open Monday thru Friday from 5 to 11pm, and Sunday from 1 to 7pm. Closed on Saturdays. There's a bar for refreshments and snacks. Shoes and other accessories can be rented. The bowling center is located down past Talk of the Town, next to the Caribe Club.

### boardsailing

Wherever there's wind and water, there's sure to be boardsailing. Boardsailing is a combination of sailing and surfing and it is a sport for all ages throughout the world. Basics can be learned within a couple of hours from certified instructors.



### glass bottom boat

A delightful two hours of fascinating ship wrecks, beautiful coral formations and colorful tropical fish. Several departures daily. Boats are sun-shaded, breeze-cooled, safe and comfortable. Check with your hotel desk for departure times and rates.

### deep sea fishing

A few miles out you'll run into Wahoo, Blue- and White Marlin, King Fish, Tuna and Bonito. The Mahi Mahi, at the Bali Pier, is the largest of many well equipped charter boats. Sign up for a half or full day charter fishing and experience the thrill of hooking a big one. Includes tackle, bait, food and refreshments.

### tanning tips

In the tropics the sun's rays beat down with greater intensity than in the temperate climes. For this reason you'll need to take greater precautions against sunburn. Heeding the following pointers could mean the difference between a fun-filled vacation or a pain-filled one...

Start off with short exposures in the sun: 20-40 minute periods alternated with equal time spent in the shade. Drink plenty of liquids to keep your pores open. Start your tan with a lotion, not an oil. Lotions and creams are designed to screen the burning rays while oil magnifies the sun's effect.

After your sunbathing don't take a hot shower. A tepid shower will be more soothing and won't wash away your skin's natural oils. Stay moist after sunbathing as well as while you're in the sun. Any number of night creams or after sun lotions are available. Some of the best are fortified with aloë and vitamin E. These soothe sunburn and help preserve the youth of your skin.

Again, moderation is the key to the safest, and sexiest tan. With a little care you can take home a deep, dark, tropical tan; a sure sign that you've been to sunny Aruba.





### snorkel & scuba

Snorkeling is often done in rather shallow waters, and can be enjoyed by young and old alike. All one needs is a diving mask, snorkel (breathing tube) and the ability to swim. Some prefer flippers for added propulsion. If you've never snorkeled before, you're guaranteed one of the most outstanding experiences you've ever had. Snorkeling trips, including boat ride to and from the site and snorkeling gear can be rented from the watersports people or purchased at Casa Deportivo Mario.

Aruba offers scuba divers excellent waters with beautiful marine life and an endless variety of coral life, reef fish and other tropical fish of infinite color and hues. Visibility under favorable conditions is up to 90 ft. Water temperature is never below 70° F. making wetsuits unnecessary.

Not far from Palm Beach, off the northwest tip of the island, lies the hulk of a German ship that was scuttled at the beginning of World War II. It's a favorite



with the scuba set as well as underwater photographers. Especially recommended for scuba diving are the areas between "F" and Malmok and between Spaans Lagoen and Commandeurs Baai (see road map). Divers are warned not to go beyond "F" to the north point of the island as the current is very strong and can be dangerous.

Scuba diving instructions as well as diving trips for experienced divers

are available through several reliable watersport operators.

### tennis anyone?



Tennis has always been a popular sport on Aruba and most hotels have courts. Qualified pros have been contracted by several hotels. There are facilities for tennis at night. Priority to hotel guests, but games can be arranged for non-hotel guests when courts are not fully booked.

There are a number of private clubs where visitors can play: P.O.V.A., Eagle, Tivoli, Caribe, San Nicolas Sportpark, the Aruba Lawn & Tennis Bond on Fergusonstraat. Equipment can be purchased at Casa Deportivo Mario.

### beaches

If you're looking for beautiful beaches, you won't have far to go. You need only to step out of your hotel room onto the soft sands of Aruba's exquisite Palm and Eagle Beaches, (see map). The discerning beachcomber, however, may want to experiment with a variety of the island's "playas", some of which are better suited to certain water activities than others, but all of which exhibit the same untouched

beauty that is distinctly Aruban.

For swimming, snorkeling and shallow beach dives, it would be hard to find better than Arashi Beach. Its clear waters, gentle currents and abundant underwater life, make it one of the island's most versatile spots. If you're traveling east along the southern coast, the beaches of Spaans Lagoen and Commandeurs Baai are good stopping points for the experienced diver or snorkeler, as well as pleasant picnic areas for the family. Bachelor's Beach is a favorite spot for the skillful windsurfer. There is also a nearby lagoon known as the "Grapefield" where shallow snorkeling is possible. Perhaps the prettiest lagoon is Baby Beach in Seroe Colorado. Only four to five feet in depth, its waters are exceptionally safe for children and inexperienced swimmers. The more seasoned snorkeler might want to explore its channel which is home to some of the island's most beautiful coral heads. East of the lagoon is Rodger's Beach, where it is possible to enjoy a little more surf. There is also a snack bar open on the weekend. The beaches of the north coast are breathtaking in their turbulent surf and romantic locations. They are Boca Prins and Dos Playa at the east and Andicouri to the west. Although it is fun to jump the waves and play in the surf at Andicouri, it is advisable to use caution when doing so, since the north coast beaches are best known for the drama of their wave-washed cliffs and the treachery of their rushing waters.

### horseback riding

Cowpersons mount up! Rancho El Paso has a trail and a horse for you! The mounts are the famous paso find horses from south of the porder and the gait is even and smooth. Whether you are a novice or in equestrian, trips through the cunucu can be arranged by your hotel nostess or call 23310 at Washington 44. Open every day but Sunday.

# about aruba

Getting to Aruba: from New York daily on American, From Miami daily on ALM and Eastern, From Puerto Rico ALM has 5 flights a week. ALM also has jet flights to other destinations in the Caribbean and South American area. And, of course, several daily flights from neighboring Curaçao. From Amsterdam KLM daily except Monday.

By ship: from New York and many other U.S. ports on year-round and seasonal cruises, Any time is a good time to visit Aruba. There's also a regular ferry boat service to Venezuela via Curaçao, once a week. Capacity: 1200 passengers, 150 cars.



Entry requirements: For proof of identity, US citizens don't need a passport. They must have either a birth certificate, naturalization papers, affidavit or Alien registration card. Canadian citizens must

have a valid passport or birth certificate. All visitors must have a through or return ticket to a destination outside the Netherlands Antilles. For further info ask your travel agent or the airline.

What to wear: for women: casual cottons, linens, light weight synthetics, swim suits, head scarves for protection of hairstyles, hats for protection against the sun, flat heeled, comfortable shoes or sandals for walking. Shorts and slacks can be worn on the streets of Oranjestad. Bikinis are seen at beaches and swimming pools. For evenings (silk or linen) dresses, a (wool) sweater or stole, slacks can be worn in the evenings as well, For men: casuals, shorts and swimtrunks during the day. It's customary for men to wear ties at business appointments and after 6pm. although this custom has relaxed in recent years. A sport jacket is a good idea. Oranjestad shops carry a complete line of wearing apparel for the entire family.




Aruba's history: scolars attribute Aruba's name to the Indian word "oruba", meaning well-placed, convenient to mainland. We like to think Spanish conquistadors called it "oro uba", meaning: "there was gold". "Ora": Shell and "oubao": Carib Indian words, are also possible derivations. No written historical record of Aruba's discovery exists.

It is assumed that it was Alonso de Ojeda who claimed the island for Spain in 1499. Hatchets, hammers and hieroglyphics left in chalk caves along the coast are evidence that the island was inhabited by the Arawaks. Fortunately, because the Spanish regarded Aruba as "valueless", it was one Caribbean island where the Indian population was not exterminated. In fact, the island enjoyed a special dispensation from the usual horrors of Spanish colonial policy. Charles V decreed that foreign colonists could not settle in Aruba, Gold was discovered in 1825, and although the mine yielded more than 3.000.000 pounds, it ceased to be economic in 1916, Black gold brought prosperity to Aruba in 1929. In that year, Standard Oil of New Jersey built a refinery at San Nicolas on the southern end of the island. This wasn't just another refinery, but, at the time, the largest in the world. At one time the refinery employed over 8,000 people. And, within three decades Aruba became an island with probably the highest standard of living in the West Indies. The illiteracy rate, for example, is exceptionally low. Today tourism has become the major factor in the island's economy. In a few short years, Aruba has become one of the most popular vacation spots in the Caribbean.



Aruba's Government: Aruba, as did all the Netherlands Antilles, became autonomous in 1954, gaining equal status as member of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, with the right to administer internal affairs. All the islands are governed by a governor, representing the Queen, and the Staten, the Legislative Council. The Staten is elected every four years by free election, at which time the Council of Ministers is formed, Aruba, Bonaire and Curação, together with the three windward islands, St. Maarten, Saba and St. Eustatius, constitute the territory of the Netherlands Antilles. They share the same rights as the inhabitants of the Netherlands, the mother country.

# customs regulations

CUSTOMS EXEMPTIONS FOR U.S. RESIDENTS RETURNING FROM A VISIT TO THE NETHERLANDS ANTILLES.

Significant benefits for international travelers are included in the Customs Procedural Reform and Simplificant Act of 1978. Highlights of the law, as of January 27, 1983 are outlined below:

- NOW, you may bring home, free of duty, \$400 worth of articles based on the retail value in country of acquisition. FORMERLY, your duty-free personal was \$300. (plus \$25 worth of Edam or Gouda cheese for personal use).
- NOW, the number of cigarettes which you may include in your duty-free exemption is 200 (1 carton). FORMERLY, the quantity of cigarettes was specified as being a quantity suitable for personal use.
- 3. Duty-free liquor is 1 quart per person over 21 years of age within the \$400 exemption. However, substantial savings can be realized when taking back more than 1 quart, because even with the duty it comes out cheaper than at the corner liquor store in the U.S. This is especially so on higher priced brands.
- 4. NOW, articles accompanying you, in excess of your personal \$400 exemption, up to \$1,000, (thus \$600) will be assessed at a flat 10% rate of duty based on the fair retail value in country of acquisition. These articles must be for personal use or for use as gifts and not for resale. This provision may be used once every 30 days, excluding the day of your last arrival. FORMERLY, goods acquired in excess of your personal exemption were dutiable at various rates of duty.
- 5. NOW, members of a family residing in one household traveling together on their return to the U.S. will group articles acquired for application of the flat duty rate regardless of which member of the family may be the owner of the articles. For example, an eligible family of four would have their articles grouped for a total of \$2,400 (see point 4) fair retail value for entry at the flat rate of duty. FORMERLY, there were no provisions for flat rates of duty.
- 6. NOW, if you cannot claim your personal \$400 exemption because you have used it in the preceding 30 days or you were out of the country for less than 48 hours (Mexico and the Virgin Islands excluded from this time limitation), you are allowed to bring in \$25 worth of articles acquired for your personal or household use. FORMERLY, the allowance was \$10.
- 7. NOW, in addition to the \$400 exemption, each traveler can mail an unlimited number of gifts valued at \$25 to friends and relatives back home, provided the addressee does not receive more than one gift parcel in a day. FORMERLY, the gift parcel exemption was \$10. No declaration is required and no tax is levied. No liquor or tobacco is permitted.
- 8. FREE OF DUTY are foreign photographic film, original paintings, drawings and sculptures, foreign language books, antiques, caviar and truffles. Under the U.S. program of trade concessions to developing regions, your gold and silver jewelry could qualify as original works of art if made in the Netherlands Antilles. Be sure to obtain a certificate from the place of purchase that your jewelry was made here. Locally made souvenirs & handicrafts are duty-free also.

- You may not bring in merchandise which originate from North Korea, North Vietnam, Rhodesia or Cuba. Goods from China are allowed.
- 10. NOW, if you understate the value of an article you declare or otherwise misrepresent an article on your declaration, you may have to pay a penalty in addition to payment of duty. Under certain circumstances the article can be seized and then forfeited if the penalty is not paid. FORMERLY, the article or its value was liable to forfeiture and duty had to be paid even if the article was seized.
- Residents returning to Puerto Rico may only take back 1 qt. of liquor and 1 carton of cigarettes within duty exemption (additional carton: \$0.80 duty).

Regulations covering the Virgin Islands, American Samoa and Guam, are different than for the Netherlands Antilles. Check with those islands or with U.S. customs.

OF COURSE, customs clearance and exemptions for both U.S. residents and visitors are subject to the same restrictions and requirements as in the past. These are covered in leaflets issued for international travelers:

"Know before you go- Customs hints for returning residents"

"Customs hints for visitors (non-residents)"

"Customs tips for visitors"

### canada

- If you've been away from Canada 24 hours or more you may bring in goods to the value of CS 20, excluding alcohol and tobacco, free of duty. This exemption may be claimed any number of times a year, but does not apply if the total value of all goods imported exceeds C\$ 20.
- 2. If you've been away 48 hours, once each calendar quarter, you may bring in C\$ 100 in goods. After 7 days' absence or more, once each calendar year, you may bring in up to C\$ 300 of goods. The yearly and quarterly exemptions can both be claimed in one quarter, but only for separate trips.
- 3. If you are eligible for the quarterly or yearly exemption, the dollar value of certain amounts of tobacco and alcohol may be brought in under that exemption. These are 200 cigarettes and 50 cigars or cigarillos and .91 kg. (2 lbs) of tobacco. You must be 16 years of age. Additional tobacco may be brought in if you are willing to pay duty and taxes on the excess. In addition if you meet the age requirement of the place where you reenter Canada, you may bring in 1.1 liters (40 oz.) of wine or liquor or 24x12 oz. cans or bottles (or its equivalent— 8.2 liters (288 fl. oz.) of beer or ale. The cost of exceeding the alcohol beverage allowance is high, but up to 9 extra liters (2 gallons) are allowed except in the Northwest Territories and on Prince Edward Island.
- You may not pool your exemptions with any other person's. All goods for exemption must be for personal or household use or gift.
- 5. After any trip abroad for 48 hours or more, you are entitled a special 20% tax rate on: goods valued up to C\$ 300 over and above your C\$ 100 or C\$ 300 personal exemption or goods valued up to C\$ 300 if no personal exemption is being claimed. This excludes alcohol or tobacco. Regular duty and taxes apply to all importations in excess.
- 6. You may send gifts to Canada worth no more than C\$ 25 free of duty. Be sure a gift card is included. This will not count against your personal exemptions. Gifts brought back with you will count against your personal exemption. No alcohol, tobacco or advertising material may be included. If gifts exceed C\$ 25, addressee must pay duty and taxes on the excess amount.
- Goods you bring in under the \$ 20 and \$ 100 exemption must accompany
  you in all cases. Under the \$ 300 exemption, they may follow by mail or other
  transport but you must declare them when you reenter Canada.
